Statement regarding the Lamoille FiberNet and Otter Creek Construction Grant requests

Lamoille FiberNet and Otter Creek CUD have both filed letters to comply with the Board's request for those CUDs to agree to adhere to future policies of the Board. Those letters are included in the packet. Staff believes that this written commitment, approved by the CUDs' governing Boards and counsel, sufficiently addresses the Board's concern.

After the Board approved the Southern Vermont application, the Board made it clear that the next application would need to have more accountability built into the agreement. Lamoille and Otter Creek heard that message and did a thorough and excellent job of meeting the Board's intent at that time. Based on the materials submitted in the original grant application for the Board's August meeting, as well as the letter from each CUD submitted today, staff believes that these CUDs have addressed each of the requirements put forward by the Board and recommends approval of these grants at the September 11 meeting.

Lamoille FiberNet Grant Request

Staff recommends the Board approve the Lamoille Fiber Construction Grant request of \$13,588,636 for the towns of Belvidere, Cambridge, Eden, Elmore, Hyde Park, Johnson, Morristown, Stowe, Waterville, Wolcott. This request covers 550 miles and 7869 passings (4170 eligible addresses) with Fidium taking all the risk related to the business case. The total cost of the Project is \$23.7 Million with Fidium contributing \$9.8 Million or 41% of the cost (VCBB share is 59%). This Grant Request has been reviewed by CTC (VCBB's contract engineering firm) who has determined that the request complies with VCBB Outside Plant Requirements.

Otter Creek Grant Request

Staff recommends the Board approve the Construction Grant request of \$9,952,273 for the towns of Benson, Brandon, Castleton, Chittenden, Fair Haven, Goshen, Hubbardton, Pawlet, Pittsford, Poultney, Sudbury, Wells, West Haven. This request covers 356 miles and 4135 passings (2316 eligible addresses) with Fidium taking all the risk related to the business case. The total cost of the Project is \$14.3 Million with Fidium contributing \$4.3 Million or 30% of the cost (VCBB share is 70%). The total Universal Service Plan cost is \$19.0 million of which the VCBB is contributing \$9.9 million which would be a VCBB share of 48% and Fidium share of 52%. This Grant Request has

been reviewed by CTC (VCBB's contract engineering firm) who has determined that the request complies with VCBB Outside Plant Requirements.

BEAD Initial Proposal Volume 1

Staff will present the overall timeline required by the NTIA and how the VCBB timelines align. Staff will then present the final version of Volume 1 to the Board for approval and submission to the NTIA. Staff has included input from Board members as well as made the relevant changes that were provided during the public comment period.

BEAD Initial Proposal Volume 2

Staff will present the Draft Proposed Volume 2 for Board input. The public comment period will commence on September 15

Ex Parte Discussions

The proposed policy for Ex Parte discussions is included in the packet. Staff supports the policy and met two weeks ago to develop staff protocols to ensure compliance with this policy.

I. Meeting Call to Order, Roll Call, & Approval of Agenda

Patty Richards called the meeting to order at 12:05 and completed roll call. Patty would like to meet new staff at the September meeting.

Patty Richards made a motion to approve the agenda Seconded by Dan. No further discussion. *Unanimously approved by Patty, Laura, and Dan.*

II. Approval of Minutes (June 12, July 18, July 28)

Patty Richards made the motion to approve all three sets of minutes, June 12, July 18, and July 28th, seconded by Laura. Discussion and agreement that the language in the minutes concerning the NEK and Maple Construction Grant amendments in item VII (NEK) (subject to VCBB policies including future policies) and VIII (Maple) (subject to being consistent or subject to VCBB current and future policy) in the July 18 draft minutes did not require revision. *Voted unanimously by Patty, Laura, Dan, and Holly*.

III. State of Vermont Emergency Board Decision Regarding Match Appropriation

Will Anderson, from the Department of Finance and Management, discussed the State of Vermont's Emergency Board's decision to reallocate \$20 million of the \$30 million allocated to the VCBB from the General Fund as match funds under Act 145, Section B (a)(28) based upon the understanding that these matching funds were not currently being used and would be returned in the 2024 Budget Adjustment Act in time for use by the VCBB in the BEAD program in mid-2024. Will expressed confidence that the amount will be available given the current revenue forecast, which anticipates a \$78.4 million surplus. Will agreed to report back to the Board concerning the status of the remaining \$10 million allocated by Act 145 and on which other appropriations had been considered when the Emergency Board determined to allocate the VCBB appropriation.

The Board indicated it would prepare a letter to the Chairs of the House and Senate Appropriations Committees concerning the VCBB's interest in the prompt reallocation of these match funds, which is to be added to next month's agenda and to the Parking Lot.

IV. Lamoille FiberNet Construction Grant Application

Staff and CTC recommended approval of both the Pre-Construction and the Construction Grants. Lisa Birmingham, Chairperson of Lamoille FiberNet (LFN), presented the applications and, along with VCBB's consultant, CTC Technology and Energy (CTC), addressed questions from the Board. The discussion concerned the enforceability of an agreement to the retroactive application of future Board policies. LFN could not agree to the same at the meeting, and the Board agreed to postpone its consideration of LFN's Construction Grant application until the next Board meeting. Holly requested staff to provide a redacted copy of CCI and Lamoille FiberNet's agreement in hopes of helping create/drive policy discussions moving forward.

Holly made a motion to grant Lamoille FiberNet's Pre-Construction Grant without caveat in the amount of \$1,369,478 seconded by Patty. No further discussion. Voted unanimously by Patty, Laura, Holly, and Dan.

V. Otter Creek Construction Grant Application

Given the commonalities between the Lamoille and Otter Creek (OCCUD) Construction Grant applications and OCCUD's indication that it would also need to postpone its agreement to the applicability of future Board policies, OCCUD agreed to present its construction grant application at the next Board meeting.

Dan left the meeting at 1:55 pm.

Patty asked if Otter Creek would like to go through their Pre-Construction application. Laura Black explained they were applying for an amendment to their Pre-Construction grant from June of 2022.

Holly Groschner made a motion to approve the Pre-Construction Grant for Otter Creek CUD in the amount of \$1,314,650 without the contingency regarding the accountability policy. Seconded by Patty. No further discussion. Voted unanimously by Patty, Laura and Holly.

Patty noted that the construction grant is tabled, if the CUD would agree to the policy provision, it could be voted on later.

VI. ECFiber Construction Grant Application

Discussion concerning whether Holly should recuse herself given that she previously served on ECFiber's Board, resolved to be unnecessary. F.X. Flinn presented the application and agreed to the application of future Board policies.

Discussion concerned whether applicant had considered what percentage of operating surplus would be put toward construction or lowering costs for consumers, which the applicant considers addressed by the business plan requirement for sustainability rather than surpluses. Holly cautioned that VCBB grant funds should not be used for elevated capacity.

Patty made a motion to approve the construction grant for ECFiber in the amount of \$13,227,657 subject to future policies being developed by VCBB related to accountability. Seconded by Laura. No further discussion. Unanimously approved by Patty, Laura, and Holly.

VII. VCUDA Updates

Moved after VIII

Rob Vietzke introduced their new Program Manager Andrew Tarley. Rob had a constructive comment to have the Board and staff map out what the next few months look like as this policy is developed and provide some predictability. Rob commented about the Emergency Board's decision and how to move forward. VCUDA has filed comments on the Five-Year Action plan. As far as Volume II, one month does feel a little tight for public comment.

VIII. BEAD Update & Intro to Needs based program to Boost the Ability of Potential Sub-Grantees to Participate in BEAD

Rob Fish discussed the needs-based program originally called the CUD Assistance Program. It is open to all applicants with financial needs to conform with the neutrality requirements on the BEAD program. Technical Assistance must be provided to all applicants including small telecom companies, CUDs, and individual Towns. VCUDA is supportive of this program. Would ask for a competitive versus first come first served basis. No action is needed as the VCBB heard a proposal from staff to change the \$1,000.000 CUD assistance program to a non-restricted application, open to anyone in the state with a bidding process and an RFP process. This was a change directed by the federal funding Agency, not the VCBB.

Lucy Rogers discussed the BEAD Five-Year Plan. Public comment period has closed. Lucy asked if there were any further questions from the VCBB, they come to her in the next couple days as the Board will be voting on the Five-Year Plan at the next scheduled Special Meeting. The Five-Year Plan is a high-level review of the State's plan. Initial Plan Volume II is where more of the details would be included. Initial Plan Volume I, public comment period closes on Friday of this week. The intent is to have Board and public comment available at the regular September Board meeting. Holly asked that these large documents coming forward not be included in the Board packet, just a link provided to the documents.

IX. Public Comment

Irv Thomae wanted to thank the Board for their support and also wanted to thank F.X. and all the ECFiber Board members for their work. Irv mentioned he believes the BEAD process will not be timely and flow well due to the bureaucratic process.

Lisa Birmingham would like to thank the board for approving their pre-construction grant and would like to schedule their Construction Grant

Laura Black also thanked the Board for its approval of the OCCUD preconstruction grant and requested the opportunity to present its construction grant application at the next Board meeting.

X. Parking Lot

Sub-Committee Assignments.

VCUDA will come back with a list of which CUD members would like to participate and on which sub-committees. Christine will get a list of names of Staff that should be listed on the sub-committees as well. Patty will pull all names from VCUDA and Christine and circulate this list hopefully on Monday, challenging committee members to get a meeting scheduled by the end of next week. Holly mentioned Rob Vietzke's request to have a timeline and Holly was hoping Patty could set some benchmarks to help move everything forward. Patty mentioned she has been working on the ex parte communication policy in consultation with Toni for the next Board meeting. Holly mentioned on that note, she received an email with information on the Otter Creek application from GoNet.

XI. Executive Session

Holly made the motion to enter executive session referencing 1 VSA § 313 a(3). Staff members Christine Hallquist, Toni Clithero, and Rob Fish are invited to discuss. Patty seconded. Vote was unanimous by Patty, Laura, and Holly. Meeting is adjourned and entered Executive session at 3:35. No action was taken.

Patty Richards made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Holly. Holly asked about addressing the sub-committees. Patty mentioned that if time allowed, discussion for the sub-committee would take place at the end of the meeting. Christine informed the board that Public Comment is a requirement, and it was not included in the Agenda. Patty amended her motion to include a discussion on sub-committees and time for public comment. *Unanimously approved by Patty, Laura, Holly, and Brian.*

II. Consideration of BEAD 5-Year Plan for submission to NTIA

Lucy summarized the BEAD 5-Year Plan and took comments and questions from the Board. Patty opened comments with her appreciation of the work that went into the creation of a well-designed and easy-to-read plan. Page 24, table 7 discusses the state match. Patty asked if there is a need for a footnote regarding the 20 million dollars that was used for flood recovery? Potentially a footnote informing the Feds of the situation and adding the commitment to recommend replacing the funding borrowed. Holly asked about page 23 regarding affordability including \$34 million for affordability. Where does this money exist? Lucy explained that the format of the report requires inclusion of funding from the federal government that we at the State of Vermont do not have influence over. Reporting to the Legislature would have to explain the annualized projection of the 34 million dollars for ACP. Laura pointed out on page 87, definitions from the NTIA, that "reliable broadband service" is defined by what the broadband data maps show. What is staff's interpretation of the maps? Lucy explained that the BEAD Initial Proposal Volume 1 will dive into this information more in depth. There are several different types of maps, Vermont did a great job challenging the FCC map. We will still attempt to use the BEAD state challenge process to further improve the mapping. We are also proposing treating wireless the same as DSL for the sake of BEAD funding and are working with the NTIA to find a solution. Holly mentioned that the Plan is not our state broadband policy, it is our broadband policy for BEAD, a particular federal program. Also mentioned removing the subtitle "internet for all," however this is not a Vermont term, it is the federal title. Lucy added that the contractor has done the graphic design and accessibility check, and any changes would require a new accessibility check to be conducted may not be worth it if there were only small changes or footnotes. Christine pointed out that the Board could add to their resolution approving

the plan. The Board could make it clear that this is to meet the BEAD requirement and was only a subset of the work being done here. Patty confirmed that unless it was super important, the recommendation would be to not make changes at this time. Patty made a motion to approve the Bead 5-Year Plan as written to meet the BEAD requirements, seconded by Brian. *Voted unanimously by Patty, Holly, Laura, and Brian.*

III. Public Comment

Kim Gates, Franklin Telephone. One of the big challenges are the line extension costs for companies, any opportunity that the Board can include the line extension program would be helpful.

IV. Policy committee assignments

Christine began the discussion describing the process that she and Patty had worked on creating the list of committees, with Board members, staff, VCUDA, and CUD members. Holly asked for clarification on the process. Patty responded that no formal process had been discussed but would hope that all policies would be developed by the end of the year. They are working with VCUDA and all the CUDs to create policy that works. Laura also feels a great sense of urgency and thinks the end of the year is too far away and would like to see October 1st as a deadline. There was discussion to make the deadline for policy creation the beginning of October, but no later than the end of October. Christine and staff will help to get meeting scheduled quickly. Rob Vietzke commented that BEAD Volume 2 is very significant in size. BEAD Volume 1 needs to be reviewed and approved in the next couple weeks and then on to Volume 2. Rob mentioned this will be a tremendous workload for VCUDA, CUDs and the Board and would require triple the efforts to complete everything. Holly asked for clarification regarding the due dates and who set them. Christine responded that the NTIA is who set the dates and it is set by legislation. Laura asked if staff could be tasked with helping to schedule meetings, including extra meetings in September and October. The Board will reach directly to Chance a for board technical support.

V. Confirm Meeting 9/11 & Motion to Adjourn

Patty made a motion to adjourn at 1:09. Seconded by Holly. Voted unanimously by Patty, Holly, Laura, and Brian.

Re: LFCUD Construction Grant Application – Clarification and Commitments

Dear Chair Richards and VCBB Board members:

Lamoille FiberNet Communications Union District ("LFCUD") looks forward to continuing and hopefully concluding consideration of our Construction Grant Application ("Application") at the VCBB's September 11th meeting. Grant approval this month is critical for Phase 1 (85% of LFCUD's unserved and underserved addresses) to be built in 2024. Like many commercial infrastructure companies, Consolidated's capital budget cycle is underway. If we miss the 2024 budget cycle, our communities may have to wait another year without broadband.

To facilitate the Board's consideration, the LFCUD Governing Board has authorized me to submit this letter, which addresses and recommends solutions to the two open issues.

- 1. Commitment to Current and Future VCBB Policies. After meeting and multiple discussions with Board staff and others, LFCUD now understands that it is not being asked to waive rights it may have. Accordingly, LFCUD's Governing Board voted to 1) support VCBB's authority to develop policies to implement Act 71, 2) actively support the development of those policies by participating in working groups and meetings and 3) reiterate our CUD's commitment to adhere to current and future lawful VCBB policies and Act 71 as may be amended.
- 2. <u>Sustainability and Succession Planning Adherence to Public Interests</u>. As a CUD, Lamoille FiberNet fully appreciates our role in public accountability and improving access to affordable, reliable broadband to our neighbors. As noted in our preconstruction amendment application, Lamoille has begun exploring shared services and partnerships with other CUD and regional resources to secure expertise and stretch our funding. As reflected in our Term Sheet exhibit, and more easily displayed on page 7 of our August 14 Presentation, LFCUD and Consolidated have agreed to a continuity plan in case of change of ownership, asset transfers, nonrenewal of the 20-year agreement, or default. That said, we know there is more work to do.



Accordingly, Lamoille would propose a grant condition to develop a strategic long-term plan that addresses the sustainability of the CUD's long-term mission. That plan will include 1) governance and succession planning 2) compliance and oversight 3) revenue opportunities and 4) program planning (adoption, digital equity support). Satisfaction of this condition can be easily documented through reporting milestones.

Based on the above, I respectfully offer for your consideration a recommended Board motion for approval as follows:

The VCBB Board approve LFCUD's Construction Grant Application conditioned on the representations and recommendations in LFCUD's letter of September 1, 2023, which includes commitments to adhere to current and future lawful VCBB policies and a grant condition to develop of a comprehensive sustainability plan.

Date: August 4, 2023

At the request of the Board, this memo provides a review of the business plan and additional documentation provided by Lamoille FiberNet Communications Union District (LFCUD). Based on our review, LFCUD's construction grant application meets the specifications put forth in the Board's Application Requirements.

LFCUD is proposing a fiber-to-the-premises (FTTP) deployment in two phases consisting of 632 miles of fiber that would connect approximately 9,050 addresses—4,900¹ of which are unserved and underserved—within the 10 member towns.² The total estimated cost for both phases is \$30,731,695. The current grant application focuses on Phase 1, which consists of 549.7 miles of fiber that would connect 7,869 total addresses, including 4,170 eligible addresses. The total cost of Phase 1 is \$25,403,670, or \$6,092 per un/underserved passing.

LFCUD is partnering with Consolidated Communications, Inc. (CCI), which will allow LFCUD to reduce the total cost of the project by approximately 30 percent. CCI has agreed to contribute \$9,814,755 of the total project cost. Seven towns are also contributing local American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds of \$275,800 as a match. The remaining \$15,313,115 is being funded by LFCUD through grant funds, \$1,724,479 of which will come from LFCUD preconstruction grant funds. LFCUD is requesting the remaining balance of \$13,588,636 from VCBB.

Under the partnership, CCI will build, operate, and maintain Phase 1 of the network. LFCUD will own all infrastructure funded by the grant, excluding core infrastructure, while CCI will own all

portions of the network built using CCI's own funding. LFCUD will continue to employ staffing including an executive director and a construction manager in addition to additional organization support such as accountants, legal support, and communications and marketing resources. The responsibilities of LFCUD staff and board include oversight of partnerships including communities and contractors (such as CCI) to ensure all requirements of the contract are being met. Additionally, LFCUD will be engaged in community outreach to promote adoption and digital equity initiatives. The term sheet also outlines performance measures that LFCUD has negotiated with CCI to mitigate risk.

LFCUD plans for construction to begin in early 2024 with completion of Phase 1 by the end of 2025.

LFCUD has not identified a funding source for Phase 2, which consists of 663 eligible addresses. CCI has agreed to build Phase 2 once funding has been secured, potentially including Broadband Equity, Access, & Deployment (BEAD) program funding. Additionally, LFCUD has reserved the right to partner with other providers to complete Phase 2 in the event that another partnership(s) would be more cost effective and reduce overbuild.

Dear Chair Richards,

Otter Creek Communications Union District ("OCCUD") looks forward to continuing and hopefully concluding consideration of our Construction Grant Application ("Application") at the VCBB's September 11th meeting. Grant approval this month is critical in order for the first phase of OCCUD's unserved and underserved addresses to be built in 2024-2025. Like many commercial infrastructure companies, Consolidated's capital budget cycle is underway. If we miss the 2024 budget cycle, our communities may very well have to wait another year without broadband.

To facilitate the Board's consideration, the OCCUD Executive Committee has authorized me to submit this letter, which addresses and recommends solutions to two issues raised at the August 14 VCBB meeting.

- Commitment to Current and Future VCBB Policies. After meeting and multiple discussions with Board staff and others, OCCUD now understands that it is not being asked to waive rights it may have. Accordingly, OCCUD's Governing Board voted to 1) support VCBB's authority to develop policies to implement Act 71, 2) actively support the development of those policies by participating in working groups and meetings and 3) reiterate our CUD's commitment to adhere to current and future lawful VCBB policies and Act 71 as may be amended.
- 2. <u>Sustainability and Succession Planning Adherence to Public Interests</u>. Otter Creek CUD board appreciates that the VCBB has emphasized the importance of the long-term sustainability of the CUD beyond the term of the grant-funded construction years. To that end, the OCCUD board has begun this discussion in recent months. We intend to continue seeking additional funding opportunities to secure necessary financial support for ongoing operational expenses, legal fees, and community engagement initiatives. We are already fostering potential partnerships with regional organizations and with other



CUD's; the goals being to reduce or eliminate operating costs and share resources while continuing our CUD's volunteer membership board. As noted in our pre-construction grant amendment application, we intend to immediately hire an executive director whose scope will include seeking funding sources, establishing support networks, and establishing a sustainable management structure in order to continue OCCUD's mission to provide affordable reliable broadband to our constituents.

As to the succession of our contract with Consolidated, our term sheet (line 5) describes that our 20-year contract has an auto-renewal as well as accommodation for termination and transition of the network assets to different ownership should default occur. (See the 8/14 Lamoille Fiber CUD presentation slide for detailed description of the Continuity agreement between OCCUD and Consolidated Communications).

OCCUD hereby proposes a grant condition to develop a strategic long-term plan that addresses the sustainability of the CUD's long-term mission. That plan will include 1) governance and succession planning 2) compliance and oversight 3) funding opportunities and 4) program planning (adoption, digital equity support).

Based on the above two issues, I respectfully request that the Board consider OCCUD's Construction Grant Application and presentation on September 11th along with the representations and recommendations in this letter, which includes commitments to adhere to current and future lawful VCBB policies and a grant condition to develop a comprehensive sustainability plan.

At the request of the Board, this memo provides a review of the business plan and additional documentation provided by Otter Creek Communications Union District (OCCUD). Based on our review, OCCUD's construction grant application meets the specifications put forth in the Board's Application Requirements.

OCCUD has proposed a fiber-to-the-premises (FTTP) deployment in four phases to reach its 2,920¹ eligible addresses within the 18 member towns.² Phase 1, including 38 unserved locations, was completed and fully financed by Consolidated Communications, Inc (CCI). The remaining 2,882 addresses are separated into three additional phases. OCCUD estimates the costs for Phases 2 and 3 to total \$19,400,131, consisting of 474 miles of fiber to serve 2,715 eligible locations. OCCUD has not yet estimated the cost for Phase 4. The current grant application focuses on Phase 2, which consists of 356 miles of fiber that would connect 4,135 total addresses, including 2,316 eligible addresses. The total cost of Phase 2 is \$14,655,482, or \$6,328 per un/underserved passing.

OCCUD is partnering with CCI, and CCI has agreed to contribute \$4,343,210 of the total project cost for Phase 2. OCCUD noted that it will also utilize Act 71 (H.360) pre-construction grant funds of \$360,000 to support the project through the construction period. OCCUD is requesting the remaining balance of \$9,952,272 for Phase 2 from VCBB.

¹ The total eligible addresses increased by 170 that were not included in VCBB's eligible address list, consisting of 39 addresses that OCCUD believes are unserved and 131 that it confirms were receiving service below 25/3 Mbps.

² Member towns are Benson, Brandon, Castleton, Chittenden, Fair Haven, Goshen, Hubbardton, Mendon, Pawlet, Pittsford, Poultney, Rutland City, Rutland Town, Shrewsbury, Sudbury, Wells, West Haven, and West Rutland.

Under the partnership, CCI will build, operate, and maintain Phase 2 and 3 of the network. OCCUD will own all infrastructure funded by the grant, excluding core infrastructure, while CCI will own all portions of the network built using CCI's own funding. As part of OCCUD's pre-construction grant request, OCCUD will be funding contractors and staff in support of its efforts over an eighteen-month period. Among their various responsibilities, the contractors and staff will have direct oversight and the ability to monitor the construction of CCI. OCCUD will also be engaged in community outreach to promote adoption. The term sheet also outlines performance measures that OCCUD has negotiated with CCI to mitigate risk.

OCCUD plans for construction to begin in early 2024 with completion of Phase 2 by the end of 2025.

OCCUD has not identified a funding source for Phase 3 or 4, which consists of 400 eligible addresses. CCI has agreed to build Phase 3 once funding has been secured, potentially including Broadband Equity, Access, & Deployment (BEAD) program funding. Additionally, OCCUD has reserved the right to partner with other providers to complete Phase 3 and 4 in the event that another partnership(s) would be more cost effective.

RE: VCBB Board Practice Proposal Untimely Documents and Agenda Item

Changes

Background

At the July VCBB meeting, we discussed the issue of documents being sent out after a Board packet was circulated. Based on a review of online material as well as discussions with VCBB legal counsel (Toni Clithero), adding new information to Board meetings is allowable but should be done with care and due consideration. In general, sending out information and documents after a board packet has been circulated is discouraged. Changes to the agenda may be made but action items requiring a vote should be avoided unless it is an emergency or necessary situation.

Toni has noted the following in her research of this matter:

With respect to documents, neither Vermont's Open Meeting Law (OML) or Roberts Rules of Order specifically address the issue of which documents may be considered during a public meeting. As a result, the OML does not prohibit the Board from considering documents added after the agenda has been posted as long as those documents fairly relate to an item on the agenda. Likewise, the OML does not prohibit the Board from instituting a practice concerning its consideration of additional documents.

It should be noted that such practice should distinguish between documents submitted by staff and those the public seeks to introduce during a meeting. Whereas it is not unreasonable for the Board to limit late staff submissions to an emergency meeting notification standards (addressed below), submissions of additional documents by the public should be allowed where the documents both concern issues noticed on the agenda and are considered necessary to express the opinion of the member of the public seeking to introduce them. See 1 V.S.A. 312(h) (requiring public bodies to provide the public with a "reasonable opportunity to express its opinion on matters considered" during the meeting). In either case, the Board may alternatively postpone consideration of any such additional documents to an adjourned meeting, as long as the time and place for the adjourned meeting is announced before the meeting is adjourned. 1 V.S.A. §312(c)(4).

It is my opinion, based on the past several decades of serving in a public body capacity, untimely documents may lead to imbalance of information; some people may see it and others may not. If material is considered paramount and should be reviewed by the VCBB Board, we should strive to take up the matter at the next regularly scheduled meeting. Allowing material to be submitted after the packet is circulated should be reserved for exceptional or emergency situations.

Toni also opined on changes to the agenda:

With respect to agenda items, Vermont's Open Meeting Law (OML) allows for the addition and deletion of agenda items. 1 V.S.A. § 312(d)(3). Under the OML, public entities may add or delete items from an agenda after it has been posted to the public if the addition or deletion is conducted as the first act of business at the meeting (1 V.S.A. § 312(d)(3).

My recommendation is that the Board avoid adding agenda items unless it is necessary and is consistent with the recommendations of the Vermont Secretary of State's Office (SOSO). (See A Guide to Open Meetings, rev. 2019, at p. 6) (attached). The SASO cautions that "last-minute agenda items, especially those requiring board action, be added at a meeting only in an emergency" and that the better practice is "to handle items that were not included on the posted agenda at the next regular meeting or, if necessary, to call a special meeting so that the public gets notice of the item and has an opportunity to attend and participate." *Id.* The OML allows public notice "as soon as possible before the meeting" where an emergency meeting is necessary to respond to an "unforeseen occurrence or condition"." 1 V.S.A. § 312(c)(3). Thus, a practice to limit the addition of agenda items to circumstances where it is necessary to respond to an unforeseen issue constitutes an appropriate Board practice.

As noted by various online sources relative to this matter, there are occasions where items need action or attention after an agenda is posted or a board packet is published. ¹ Some items can require quick action due to the nature of the matter. However, as a public body we should assure first there is a **need** for **immediate** action. Second, we became aware **after** the agenda and board packet was publicized

Recommended Practice

In general, I recommend that we avoid sending out documents after the Board packet is posted. Having all the material in one central place (board packet) assures all Board members and

stakeholders have the opportunity to review relevant information being considered and discussed.

Also, it is recommended to avoid adding agenda items at the last minute, if possible, but noting there are times it may be necessary. To add an agenda item, it will take a majority of Board members present to revise the agenda. In addition, the item must meet a standard of needing immediate action such as an unforeseen emergency

I look forward to discussing this recommendation at our upcoming meeting.
