Emergency Board Decision

The Vermont Emergency Board met as part of the state-wide crisis related to the recent flooding. The Board is set up to manage the state and funding in the event of an emergency. The Vermont Emergency Board (E-Board), established under 32 V.S.A. §131, is composed of the Governor and the Chairpersons of the Legislature's four (4) "money committees" (Senate Appropriations, Senate Finance, House Appropriations, and House Ways & Means Committees). The Board has temporarily reallocated \$20 Million (out of \$30 Million) in funds that are committed for use by the VCBB to match federal funding sources, such as BEAD to the emergency flood relief effort. The Administration has committed to return those funds in time for the BEAD program. A representative from Finance and Management will be at the Board meeting to provide further information and answer questions.

Lamoille FiberNet Grant Request

Staff recommends the Board approve the Lamoille Fiber Preconstruction Grant request of \$1,724,479 and the Construction Grant request of \$13,588,636 for the towns of Belvidere, Cambridge, Eden, Elmore, Hyde Park, Johnson, Morristown, Stowe, Waterville, Wolcott. This request covers 550 miles and 7869 passings (4170 eligible addresses) with Fidium taking all the risk related to the business case. The total cost of the Project is \$23.7 Million with Fidium contributing \$9.8 Million or 41% of the cost (VCBB share is 59%). This Grant Request has been reviewed by CTC (VCBB's contract engineering firm) who has determined that the request complies with VCBB Outside Plant Requirements.

Otter Creek Grant Request

Staff recommends the Board approve the Otter Creek Grant Pre-construction grant request of \$1,314,650 and a Construction Grant request of \$9,952,273 for the towns of Benson, Brandon, Castleton, Chittenden, Fair Haven, Goshen, Hubbardton, Pawlet, Pittsford, Poultney, Sudbury, Wells, West Haven. This request covers 356 miles and 4135 passings (2316 eligible addresses) with Fidium taking all the risk related to the business case. The total cost of the Project is \$14.3 Million with Fidium contributing \$4.3 Million or 30% of the cost (VCBB share is 70%). The total Universal Service Plan cost is \$19.0 million of which the VCBB is contributing \$9.9 million which would be a VCBB share of 48% and Fidium share of 52%. This Grant Request has been reviewed by

CTC (VCBB's contract engineering firm) who has determined that the request complies with VCBB Outside Plant Requirements.

ECFiber Grant Request

Staff recommends the Board approve the ECFIber Grant request of \$13,227,657 for the towns of Bradford, Corinth, Fairlee, Newbury, Topsham, Washington, West Fairlee and Windsor. This request covers an additional 543 miles and 8156 passings (3457 eligible addresses) to their existing network which ECFiber has been successfully constructing for the past 15 years. The project total cost is \$30.4 Million with ECFiber contributing 55% of the cost through bonds (VCBB share is 45%). This Grant Request has been reviewed by CTC (VCBB's contract engineering firm) who has determined that the request complies with VCBB Outside Plant Requirements.

Program for Sub-Grantee assistance to Participate in BEAD

As part of the 2024 budget approved by the VCBB Board, a line item in the budget was allocated for "Capacity Grants" with the staff assurance that the Board will have the opportunity to approve the grant program related to this line item. This competitive, needs based program will provide potential provide sub-grantees financial and technical support in preparing and applying for BEAD funding. Staff will present an outline for the proposed grant program to the Board for approval. The goal of the program is to increase the quality of applications and to ensure participation by non-traditional or disadvantaged entities.

Minutes

1) Meeting call to Order, Roll Call, and Approval of Agenda

Patty Richards called the meeting to order at 12:17 and completed roll call.

Patty Richards made a motion to approve the agenda as posted. Dan Nelson seconded, and it was unanimously approved.

2) Approval of May 8 Meeting Minutes

Patty Richards moved to approve, Brian Otley seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved.

3) Introduction to and Framework of Confidential Legal Issues – Toni Clithero – Executive Session - Confidential attorney-client communications made for the purpose of providing professional legal services. 1 V.S.A. § 313(a)(1)(F)

The Board needs to be informed of a legal issue. Toni Clithero explained this is an opportunity to inform the Board of a brewing legal issue. Patty Richards made a motion to go into executive session, seconded by Dan Nelson. It was unanimously approved. Toni Clithero, Christine Hallquist, Lucy Rogers, and Rob Fish joined the executive session, as well as the Board members. They returned from executive session at 1:08. No action was taken.

4) Budget Presentation – Christine Hallquist

Christine Hallquist presented the budget. Reporting will be done on a quarterly basis once the budget is approved. (See Appendix 1 for more information and charts). Brian Otley asked about contractual grant. He asked to clarify that that means incoming funding from an external source used to pay either for operational expenses or awards, correct? Christine Hallquist said this is what we're paying out, yes, this budget is the proposed cost side.

She explained the difference between contractual and non-contractual grants. Both are to cover contracts they have with third parties. Holly Groschner said contracts are expenditures that are not capital in nature. Christine Hallquist said that is right. Big drivers here are personnel and contracts. Brian Otley said the name should be changed from "non-capital grants" to "non-capital grant costs." Christine Hallquist said she will change that.

Laura Sibilia joined the meeting at this point.

Christine Hallquist started with contract costs first. The Vernonburg contract is being paid for by infrastructure grant and equity grant.

Holly Groschner asked how the Vernonburg contract could be a construction grant? Christine Hallquist said she's using the terms from the federal programs. Holly Groschner said the BEAD money is also for planning. Christine Hallquist said yes, it is. Brian Otley suggested adding a line that says the deliverables. Christine Hallquist will investigate if that's possible.

Holly Groschner asked if it could call it BEAD infrastructure or planning so it doesn't show up as a capital cost. Brian Otley said planning can be lumped into capital costs. Christine Hallquist said it's categorized by the money that's paying for it, a planning grant.

Holly Groschner asked whether the money has to be subgranted? Christine Hallquist said it is not being subgranted. There is a separate capital grant program. Capital is not addressed in this. Brian Otley said it is confusing the way it's labeled. Christine Hallquist said it is how Power BI (the state system) works, but she will try to work on that.

Dan Nelson says the names are automatically generated.

Christine Hallquist talked about asset mapping and technical workshops. She explained capacity grants. It's money to provide CUDs money to update their business plans. Digital equity community outreach is a big part of the work we're doing. That covers BEAD and digital equity.

Next is NBRC grant that the Board approved. VCUDA capacity grant is part of that. It is for shared services for CUDs. As built inspections will be done by NB&C. \$24,000 is set aside for make ready support, but might not need to use it. Patty Richards asked about that line item. Christine Hallquist said we probably won't need to use it.

Christine Hallquist said there is a VCBB TBD item. It's for flexibility since things are changing. Patty Richards asked how that number was calculated. Rob Fish said that was the remaining funds.

Christine Hallquist said we are using Ice Miller to help with match and letter of credit. There is money for grant writers. Rob Fish explained that CUD Broadband Finance Program is additional grants along the lines of what we did for NEK Broadband. Christine Hallquist said Stone and CTC engineering come out of USF. Rural Innovation Strategies is analysis we've already done.

Holly Groschner asked where to find anything on affordability in the budget. Christine Hallquist said we need direction from the Board on that, on how to address affordability. Patty Richards said they're going to come back around to it. Holly Groschner and Laura Sibilia are coming back with more for them. Patty Richards said we need to come back with a definition of affordability and a policy in order to hold the CUDs responsible for it. Holly Groschner said CUDs will need

support on this. She suggested taking 10% off the top of capital and non-capital costs and setting it aside for affordability evaluation and administration. Not supplementing rates. Christine Hallquist said we have a broadband project developer starting soon. This will be that person's job. Christine Hallquist said we need to make a plan first. Holly Groschner says the Board opens themselves up to criticism if they don't have a line item for affordability.

Laura Sibilia said affordability goes to the accountability issue and retaining that ability for the public good. When we get into situations where we don't have strong contracts that ensure the public good in perpetuity, we're not doing our job in assuring affordability going forward. Private for-profit companies can drop prices for some time and then raise them. That's happening in an attempt to undermine public accountability.

Dan Nelson says this is a good budget. Until we have a policy, this is a great start. Affordability needs to be sustainable, not based on grants.

Dan Nelson left at 1:36, plans to return.

Brian Otley said affordability was an element of the plan of each CUD. Our role is to monitor and make sure it's part of all business plans, not to develop it.

Holly Groschner said she's read the grant language and all they do is ask CUDs if they are doing affordability. We need to set aside funding to pay for the evaluation, administration, opportunity to investigate affordability and make it a priority. We need a policy and anticipate it will be harder to take money away from categories once they're committed.

Brian Otley said that makes sense. We should have a policy. Then CUDs will more likely hit the mark.

Holly Groschner says she doesn't agree that it doesn't belong in the budget now. It should reflect the mission and objective of the VCBB.

Patty Richards said it is the CUDs' responsibility to address affordability. We need our definition of what that means. Line item of \$205,000 can be used if we need to.

Holly Groschner suggested changing the line-item name to "affordability administration" from "VCBB TBD." Christine Hallquist said that's fine. Line item 11 will be renamed "affordability administration." We will need approval from NBRC since the money comes from there. It's a place holder for something we may need.

Patty Richards – asking for approval for 4.4 million? Christine Hallquist said yes.

Christine Hallquist said the personnel budget is self-explanatory.

Holly Groschner asked if there's a scope of work for the PSD contract? Christine Hallquist said it's not a contract, it's a position. That's Kristin Brynga's former position.

Laura Sibilia– is this sustainable through the USF? Christine Hallquist said yes, and we will look at personnel costs as time goes on. Laura Sibilia said USF is likely to be declining unless something changes. We need to make sure we're keeping an eye on our staffing and funding.

Laura Sibilia moved to approve the budget with changes suggested by the Board. Patty Richards seconded, and there was unanimous approval. Dan Nelson was not present for the vote.

Don't need approval for individual grants because the Board approves each.

5) BEAD/Digital Equity: Vernonburg Project Presentation, Overview, and Timeline – *Christine Hallquist*

Introduced Vernonburg for an update to keep the Board informed. Lucy Rogers will start presenting to the Board since she has their presentation and send a note to Vernonburg to find out if they're having difficulty getting on the meeting.

Christine Hallquist asked if we can do staff updates first and then Vernonburg can present when they're here since we finished prior agenda items earlier than they were scheduled. We did staff updates next and came back to Vernonburg.

6) Staff Updates

• General VCBB Updates – Rob Fish

Rob Fish gave an update on the hiring process and an update on the FCC challenge results.

- Dashboard Review Alissa Matthews did not go to Alissa Matthews for an update.
 - Communications & Media Herryn Herzog

Herryn Herzog gave an update on recent media stories and reminded everyone that links to all stories are on the "VCBB In the News" page on our website.

Patty Richards asked about the letter of credit issue. Christine Hallquist said we are asking for a waiver from the federal government and reaching out to different organizations to help us out on that.

Patty Richards asked about a weekly update on the programs we're going after. Christine Hallquist said there is no update, and we should know something at the end of July. Patty Richards asked Laura Sibilia if she's familiar with it. Laura Sibilia said she was not aware the application had been submitted. Laura Sibilia said they should talk about whether the Board should be made aware when applications are submitted. Christine Hallquist said they were updated in the weekly update. Patty Richards said staff should work with Laura Sibilia and other state lawmakers to push this through. Laura Sibilia said this was submitted June 1 and was in the report June 6.

Toni Clithero said if we are going to discuss particular applications we need to go into executive session because these are confidential matters. Laura Sibilia said this is about dates, not the specific application. Patty Richards said this is about the process and leveraging our resources. Toni Clithero said this is a slippery slope and she's worried we could divulge confidential information that would jeopardize our application. Patty Richards wants to keep it in open session and will move if we need to.

Laura Sibilia wants to discuss protocol on submitting applications to make sure everyone is aware, particularly when we're looking at political entities. Laura Sibilia said this is our second constitutional officer issue that we've had. We've had discussions about testimony. She thinks the Board has to have the staff's back and it's impossible if they don't have the information on what's happening with the staff. Holly Groschner said this should be added to the parking lot and staff can come up with policy. Patty Richards said this is a growth issue, not throwing anyone under the bus. Staff will pull something together on this for the next meeting.

Rob Fish added that we decided to apply for a USDA Broadband Technical Assistance grant.

The Board is the VCBB. When there are decisions regarding funding and critical issues, we need to keep Board members engaged in that process. Christine Hallquist said staff will come back with a policy for the Board to review.

Christine Hallquist asked what the Board's will on the USDA application is. Do they want a special meeting or staff not to apply? Patty Richards said she just wants to know about it but doesn't want to hold it up. Holly Groschner said that is next week. It would be great if there is a thumb nail included this week to let them know.

Vernonburg Update

Breese McIlvaine presented Vernonburg slides. (See Appendix 2)

Holly Groschner asked if there's a place on the web for the public to go to to get more information about our listening sessions. Alex Jeffery from Vernonburg Group said we have a calendar, but we can add more information to the calendar.

Alex Jeffery presented more information about the next steps, RFI (request for input) has gotten responses, and they've added weekly office hours.

Starting this week, we are starting in-person and virtual listening sessions for the next three weeks or so, designed to be discussions that are community-led to hear lived experience of Vermonters.

Paul Garnett from Vernonburg Group presented early input we're getting from stakeholders.

Patty Richards asked about the slides. They say they're confidential, but are they really? Can we put them on our website? It shouldn't say they're confidential so there aren't any concerns about confidentiality.

Laura Sibilia asked to what extent are they monitoring ACP? Paul Garnett said it was separate and will run out unless it's extended and asked how that takes away funding. Laura Sibilia said it's a subsidy for private providers and undermines the buildout of community projects like ours. Paul Garnett said it's not just for for-profit providers.

Holly Groschner thanked Paul Garnett for the comment. ACP is allowing low-income households to participate in community broadband in ECFiber. They are benefiting. We should be careful about how we address this. Laura Sibilia said it should be applied to public programs only.

7) VCUDA Updates – Rob Vietzke

Ellie de Villiers did the VCUDA update. CUD construction season is in full swing. DVFiber has a contract for its build out. CVFiber, NEK Broadband, and Maple are all very busy with

construction. Southern VT is ahead of schedule. ECFiber is about to complete its original 23-town network.

NBRC agreement is signed. The timing is good. We need a little cross-CUD support.

BEAD planning 5-year action plan – comment period is critical for the CUDs. Encouraged by the work so far.

Want to understand how public comment will be reviewed and discussed by the Board before the Board approves the plans.

Multiple CUDs were having issues with a pole owner. They made progress on a number of issues.

8) Public Comment

Christa Shute said at the last meeting Rob said she would provide written comment on accountability and affordability. She does intend to do that. She's behind schedule due to a family emergency. She said they're very excited about the ReConnect award. It will impact many towns and the CUD as a whole. ReConnect event is coming June 24.

F.X. Flinn said everyone is invited to ECFiber's golden patch cord event. Senator Welch will be there. They're hoping Governor Scott will be there. They're hoping for a crowd. This symbolizes the completion of their original 23-town network. June 16 will be ECFiber's ninth anniversary.

9) Parking Lot – Christine Hallquist

Two things – follow up from the report from the Auditor's Office. Patty Richards is working on that. Christine Hallquist said she added an item to develop a policy on how staff keeps the Board informed.

10) Confirm Next Regular Meeting 7/10 & Motion to Adjourn

Patty Richards asked Christine Hallquist if we can move the application deadline back. Christine Hallquist said she has to consult with staff. Patty Richards asked how many grant applications are coming in July. Christine Hallquist said four or five, and we might need to have another meeting in July. Patty Richards said we should hold the meeting on July 10th and see how far we get. Then we can hold another meeting if needed. Other Board members agreed. Holly Groschner asked that an accountability and affordability discussion be put on the agenda.

Christa Shute clarified that she was asking to extend comment period to Vernonburg Group to June 25 or 26, not the application deadline that Patty Richards referred to.

Patty Richards moved to adjourn, Laura Sibilia seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Patty Richards made a motion to approve the agenda with a suggested change of adding a section for "Ex Parte communications" by Holly Groschner. Inserting the requested topic immediately after this section.

II. Ex Parte Communication

Discussion between Patty, Holly, and Christine focused on what items should be acted on during the public meeting versus what items had been properly warned. Patty will look into the procedural aspect with Robert's Rules of Order to assist with determining what the Board should be discussing when items for discussion have not been warned. Laura mentioned scheduling Board meetings twice a month instead of the current once a month meeting. Brian thought if more meetings were to be scheduled, they would have to be only an hour to an hour and a half in duration as the current four-hour blocks are difficult to clear, Dan echoed once a month meetings and maintaining flexibility if other meeting were needed to deal with a particular issue. Patty agreed with maintaining the once-a-month schedule and adding additional meetings if necessary. Dan mentioned the potential of sub-committees to address some of Laura's concerns and discuss policies. Dan also mentioned adding a discussion regarding safety concerns and construction.

III. Approval of June 10th Meeting Minutes

Tabled until August 14th meeting.

IV. Accountability Policy for Grants - Holly Groschner and Laura Sibilia

Patty commended the effort put forth by Holly and Laura in developing this policy, Laura recognized the work done by Toni Clithero. Holly began the presentation regarding the Policy, see attached slides, noting an important part of the policy.

- Addressing the payout process as follows: 30% on execution, have a performance payments up to 30% based on the approval of the grant manager and then after completion of 50% of the projects that you can have 60% of the payments out it appears, but there is up to 90% available at 50% of the project and then 10% upon compliance and testing.
- Dan mentioned adding Indicators to Performance. Holly continued with stating page five established standards for recouping of grant funds and transferring ownership of grantfunded network assets if a grantee materially fails to comply with the terms and conditions of a grant., and it's really up to the VCBB to determine how much of the grant funds should be recouped. Of course, based on recommendation of staff, but I think one of the things we need to know and it's an item for the parking lot is what is the process staff is following for review. The Board would like to see a presentation from staff on the process of grant review. added to the parking lot.
- Open architecture is required, as this is public money, and it was the intent that the networks have an open architecture policy. This is undrafted and deserves maybe the same subcommittee that Dan is leading could pick this up. Dan commented that the policy should enable the staff to do approvals because a lease or an assignment or an IRU with the service provider in that territory, we wouldn't want that to conflict with what's intended here so that the Board does not need to approve this. Patty supports the secondary lien approach, making sure we get feedback from VCUDA and the CUDs on this item because it's imperative we don't hold up the lending capability.
- Next, continuity of service, and this requires some reporting from the CUDs and this is an obligation on our part and to make sure there's uninterrupted broadband service I think it's only appropriate that when we're looking at the standard of availability, we also have the opportunity to tap consumer complaints that are registered with the Department of Public Service. This requires an annual submission by CUDs. Staff would have to develop what that submission looks like, more than a one pager, that goes to the standards that are adopted here. Creating an operating agreement that ensures the performance meets the standards and how it will be enforced. Based on subsection B. Add this to the parking lot and please note that the CUDs and VCUDA should take an active role.
- Prohibit the sale or transfer grant funded network assets without the prior written approval of the Board for projects funded by the grant. This item should be added to the parking lot as well.
- Allow an applicant to seek reconsideration of a Board or staff decision.
- Ensure Project Completion within 24 months of the date of the grant unless the term of the grant is extended by decision of the VCBB for cause.
- Comply with Administrative Bulletin #5 and 3.5. 8086H1 requires CUDs borrow funds for personal financing and to provide written notice to the VCBB in the event that the CUD becomes aware that it's at risk of financial insolvency. This should be added to the parking lot. CUDs have annual auditing requirements.
- Sunset Provisions, a request from Holly to form a subcommittee to discuss the sunset provisions and what legislative initiatives or interagency activity needs to happen to address the sunset provisions including continued monitoring of public interest.
- The implied accountability for the VCBB to protect the public interest. The priority is given for universal service and geographic distribution of funds. This is something that staff has implemented, in the grant process, but we need to state that we're looking at 8086 B in making grant decisions across the grant making program as a whole, not on a one-to-one comparative basis, it's implied in the in the language of the act that we're going to have 12 grants lined up, and we're going to pick the ones that give priority to universal service and

geographic distribution funds. Clarification on the implication is important moving forward. Adding this to the parking lot to ensure priority is given to addresses, we have made a policy decision to prioritize addresses on the grid. That does not satisfy the totality of the directions of the act, but that's definitely within our authority to determine that grid-connected addresses are the are a priority in making the grants, and that policy has to be stated here. Dan noted that the implied accountability requirements to protect the public interest is where the language is for prioritization of on-grid locations.

- Leverage existing private resources and assets with the high priority given to partnerships between CUDs and a distribution utility. There should not be a need for a policy that's prioritizing partnerships between CUDs and distribution utilities.
- Project Readiness is incorporated already by the viable business plan requirement and is already part of the grant application process.
- Provide broadband service that complies with net neutrality and consumer protection standards. A certification of each grantee annually that it meets the service conditions described in subsection 348B and subsequent section 348V. This is currently a voluntary consumer standard certification, but we would like grant recipients to be obligated to make those certifications and incorporate in the standards that are set for 348B for all of the lifetime of those assets. The subcommittee should look more into the criteria and what is a reasonable indicator of service and also is enforceable.
- Support low income or disadvantaged communities. What we've chosen to do is to rely on universal services. So this is really a basic policy that suggests that if you feel that there is a grantee that is avoiding service to certain people or areas that seem to fit a profiling problem, you could appeal to the VCBB because this policy is in place.
- Promote geographic diversity of fund allocations is in the Statute, but it's already addressed at -8086B, noting that it's addressed.
- Provide consumers with affordable service options, this is a call to create an outreach and equity plan for the inclusion of low-income households. So, we're asking for an outreach and equity plan, and I think we're going to need to create standards for those plans. Please add to the parking lot of what those plans should entail, but this is about evolving best practices.
- Include public broadband assets that can be shared by municipal service providers that can support a variety of public purposes. Open Architecture reference.
- Under this section, VCBB Board will not accept self-certification by the applicant or grantee to establish accountability for the public interest obligations of construction and operation, assets paid for and more in part by the Community Broadband Fund. Further details will be developed in connection with the work relating to the sunset provisions.

Laura made the motion to pause grants until the VCBB adopts these policies, seconded by Holly. Discussion included set a special meeting for July 28th to specifically address this policy. There was a suggestion put forward by Christa Shute to consider we act on the NEK and the Maple Grant today, with the caveat that the issuance of the grants today, if approved, would be subject to any policies that are adopted by the VCBB.

For the special meeting on the 28th, all board members are available at 08:00 with a hard stop at 11:00 for Dan.

The Board heard from Rob Vietzke from VCUDA. Rob will work on providing a list of statements that they would want to focus on.

Laura suggested the VCBB include VCUDA and the CUDs on the subcommittees to develop VCBB Policies.

Moving forward with the scheduled special meeting on the 28th, Laura said she would be happy to withdraw and that the Board proceed with these two grant applications, hearing them and making decisions on them.

Laura withdrew her motion and Holly concurred with the withdrawal as the seconder of the motion.

The motion is no longer on the table, No further action required.

Submissions or comments to be considered on the special meeting on the 28th must arrive to Toni by the 24th by noon.

V. BEAD Initial Proposal & Five-Year-Plan. – *Lucy Rogers and Vernonburg Group* See attached presentation slides.

Lucy Rogers introduced the BEAD Initial Proposal and the Five-Year plan and answered questions form the Board on the differences. Lucy introduced Breese McIlvaine from the Vernonburg Group. Breese explained Vermont is working toward this vision through coordinating, facilitating, supporting, and accelerating community broadband solutions. Outlined in the five-year action plan five goals for this effort.

- The first is mobilized resources for end-to-end fiber broadband infrastructure deployments to all unserved and underserved locations and community anchor institutions, then also ensuring sustainable community-driven solutions across the entire state.
- We also want to ensure high-speed broadband services and devices are affordable and advance digital equity for all Vermonters, and an advanced workforce development for broadband and the digital economy, and also improve socioeconomic conditions across Vermont.

As part of the plan, we include information about the current state in Vermont for our broadband access, broadband deployment, adoption, affordability and broader digital equity.

And so in the plan, you'll see some description of needs and gaps as well as assets in the state of Vermont around these areas. And just to call out a few that are familiar to you,

- about 20% of households in Vermont lack access to 100 by 20 megabits per second broadband connectivity
- of the Vermont households that are eligible for a for ACP, the affordable connectivity program, only 17% are have enrolled so far, and 23,000 approximately Vermont households have access to the Internet but can't afford it right now. This includes both mobile phone and broadband service.

Laura asked for a list of who is receiving those subsidies in the state of Vermont by company. Lucy will work with Vernonburg to pass it along to the VCBB members.

Christine and Board members commended the work from Vernonburg. Patty asked about deadlines for comments from the Board, Lucy responded with if there's any comment that you feel you absolutely need to discuss with us prior to the posting of the rough draft for public comment, we need to have that conversation by the end of the day today.

As far as comments, we will continue taking comments from Board members as we take comments from the public as well and the deadlines are August 02, 2023 for the 5-year action plan and August 18, 2023 for the Draft Initial Proposal.

Moved to after the Grant Proposals, items VII and VIII

\$516,000 was granted by the State to the Department of Labor. Other Agencies are not able to take on this grant due to staffing issues. So we've got the training being carried out by the Fiber Broadband Association and that we're using their training package and the Wireless Infrastructure Administration already manages these apprenticeship programs. Office of Professional Regulation should be contacted. Holly pointed out that we need to approve this now because otherwise we're waiting a whole year to initiate or continue this training program that we had planned to do.

Patty Richards put a motion on the table that we approve the acceptance of a grant from the Vermont State University of \$516,000, subject to Christine pursuing the OPR Certification, Office of Professional Regulation. Holly Groschner seconded. No further discussion. Holly, Laura, and Patty all voted in favor, Dan and Brian were absent for the vote.

Patty Richards put a motion on the table to approve the NEK broadband grant request of \$17,939,636 subject to VCBB policies including future policies. Motion was seconded by Holly Groschner. No further Discussion. Holly, Laura, Dan and Patty all voted in favor. Brian was absent for the vote.

VIII. Maple Broadband Grant Proposal- Ellie de Villiers

Existing Grant \$8,686,000 Current Grant Request \$2,157,386 Increase miles from 180.6 to 244.3. Increase addresses passed from 1,188 to 2,748. Add service in portions of Vergennes, Ferrisburgh, New Haven, Monkton, and Waltham.

Board discussion ensued for clarifying questions regarding expended funding, flooding, and areas that are already served are not included. Costs were reduced per mile, Ellie shared that lower construction costs were lower than projected.

Patty Richards put a motion on the table to approve the Maple Broadband grant request of \$2,157,386, subject it to being consistent or subject to VCBB current and future policy. Seconded by Holly Groschner. No further discussion. Holly, Laura, Dan and Patty all voted in favor. Brian was absent for the vote.

IX. VCUDA Update – Rob Vietzke

• Rob Vietzke reported that the public comment process that's opening up is really important, for information, VCBB sent out a 52 question RFI a month or so ago. VCUDA responded

with 43 pages of comments to those 52 questions, and frankly we were concise. But there is a lot of detail and nuance in the way these programs need to be implemented in order to protect the public trust and make sure we maintain the community broadband aspect of the programs through BEAD.

- We also sent out a RFP for a strategist to assist with BEAD commentary and to help the CUDs with that, and we have a contractor that we were planning to bring in in August as a shared service to help us through both the comment period for volume 2 with some expertise and the way the NTIA thinks about these things as well as to help us through the application process and the competitive grant process.
- We accepted an offer yesterday afternoon for an associate program coordinator, so that will be a full-time staffer joining VCUDA in mid-August, and that's kind of the first piece of the shared services infrastructure that we're working on.
- Finance Committee is working on a request for information related to the Shared Treasurer and some of the financial support services, as well as HR as an expanded scope.
- We are starting to have a number of conversations about financing that matches up to both the letter of credit and the minimum 25% match criteria for bead.
- We're talking about legislation for 2024 and of course, reactions to the five-year plan and volume one and the challenge process.
- We have received a draft MOU from Green Mountain Power related to the tariff rider credit extension, which is up next March and we have replied with comments.
- We think it's a really constructive set of agreements that will increase the partnership between Green Mountain Power and the CUDs and so that's not done yet, but it's really on a good track in terms of creating some new opportunities, extending the tariff rider credit, and increasing the way that tariff rider credit can be used across make-ready applications.

X. Staff Updates

- General Counsel Toni Clithero
 - Executive session? Toni would like to recommend that the Board essentially adopt each of the proposals, the five-year plan, the initial proposal volume one and two, and then it will be the final proposal, but each one of these particular deliverables is going to ultimately constitute this new program that the Board is going to be administering. And so based on the Board's authority under 8084 A to have approval authority with respect to program design, I think it's imperative for the Board you do more than just provide comments, but to actually have a formal adoption of each of these deliverables.
- General VCBB Updates Rob Fish
 - Weekly reports have been provided to the Board.
 - New staff: Steven as our broadband project developer, Chance as our Administrative services 3 and Britaney as our Digital Equity Officer. We will do a more formal introduction at a later meeting to save time today.
 - We officially received our rejection letter from the NTI Middle Mile grant program. This was expected. We are still waiting to do a feedback session with the NTIA to find out exactly why. Our initial impression is most of the grants that were approved had well over 50% match, which was way in excess of what was required.
 - This does open up the question of the Budget Adjustment Act. Last year, \$30 million was provided for the middle mile or other federal programs as match. So we are examining any changes that would be required or ways to leverage those funds to solve some of the other issues related to BEAD. Potentially also in regard to those other issues regarding BEAD with the letter of credit proposal

that we had submitted to the Treasurer for the Local Investment Advisory Committee, it's not going to be evaluated as a result of the funding. They're switching their focus entirely to housing and to flood relief, which is understandable.

- CUD Progress Updates *Lucy Rogers*
 - We are expecting up to four applications for the August meeting.
 - Received a question if there is a possibility to transfer money from their preconstruction allocation into their construction allocation. Staff is reviewing for precedence. Ultimately, this will be decided by the Board.
- Communications & Media *Herryn Herzog*
 - We have had a lot of media attention, and since our last meeting in June, we had several stories about our listening sessions we held across the state. We got a lot of coverage on our \$229 million federal BEAD allocation. I think I counted 16 separate stories and then there was also a lot of media attention for ECFiber's celebration of completing the network in their 23 original town.

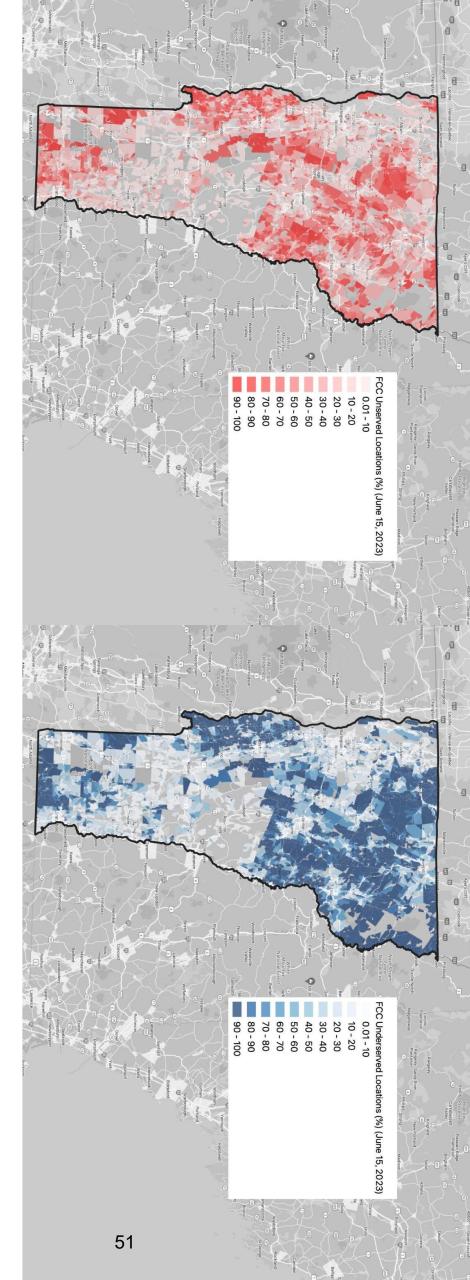

I. Meeting Call to Order, Roll Call, & Approval of Agenda

Patty Richards called the meeting to order at 08:05 and completed roll call.

Patty Richards made a motion to approve the agenda with a suggested change of removing the Parking Lot and ending the meeting with Executive Session and to add VCUDA updates as a standing item. Seconded by Laura. No further discussion. Unanimously approved.

II. Accountability Policy

Holly commented on the Public Comment Matrix that was provided by Toni and thanked the respondents for their participation and comments to the Accountability Policy. Holly also noted that NTIA has filed a Request for Comments on the applicability of the federal Uniform Guidance to the BEAD Program.

III. Public Comment

B. VCUDA

Rob Vietzke and Eliie de Villiers presented the VCUDA comments utilizing a PowerPoint presentation (listed as attachment 1). VCUDA started by mentioning that their comments were not yet a consensus and did not represent every one of their members as seen by other comment submittals. They emphasized the role of CUDs in achieving accountability under Acts 71 and 79 and stressed the importance of the aggressive timelines in BEAD, noting there is an opportunity to help develop policy for BEAD as well.

C. Consolidated Communications

Sarah Davis, spoke to what their entity has done in the last 16 months and spoke in support of what the CUDs have accomplished with respect to Accountability. CCI's major concern is the lien proposal.

D. Waitsfield and Champlain Valley Telecom

Roger Nishi spoke for WCVT and agreed that accountability is important but questions whether the VCBB adding more accountability standards that may affect the cost of services provided and stressed the concern that liens might have on the ability to obtain financing.

E. Southern Vermont CUD

Eric Patch spoke for Southern Vermont CUD. Southern Vermont CUD agrees with the need for accountability but expressed concern that the Board was regulating rather than focusing on delivering broadband.

F. ECFiber

F.X. Flinn spoke for EC Fiber. The Board should consider whether these are policies or guidelines. The State has set a goal for VCBB regarding broadband, ARPA (pretty flexible), BEAD (a line extension program) and Municipal revenue bonds. Would encourage the VCBB to help support CUDs and help them become a sustainable business that can secure funding through the Municipal bond market.

G. NEK Broadband

Christa Shute spoke for NEK Broadband. NEK endorses the Accountability Policy with some modifications. She spoke in support of the lien proposal, noting that stacked financing is reasonable. NEK thinks that it would be useful if adjoining towns could discuss having a single entity providing service. She also spoke in favor of enforceability provisions in the grant agreements.

H. Otter Creek

Laura Black spoke for Otter Creek CUD. Accountability is Important and we want to be sure that the VCBB would continue to move forward with the Grant process. Our constituents are really excited to get fiber versus the copper network they are currently using. The VCBB clarified that Grant issuance has not paused and requested that Otter Creek proceed with its application.

I. Lamoille Fibernet CUD

Lisa Birmingham spoke for Lamoille Fibernet. Lamoille i will be submitting their application next week, expressing the belief that long term accountability is the responsibility of the CUDs.

J. **Staff Comments:** Christine Hallquist commended the Boards handling of the Accountability Policy and its decision not to delay applications during development of the policy. Also spoke in favor of the approach of "Controls" versus "Control".

Other Comments:

Jonathan Cooper: Employed by the Bennington County Regional Commission. Staff for Southern Vermont CUD. Spoke about the accountability by the CUD during the feasibility study and their selection of their private-public sector partner.

Jane Campbell: Lamoille Fibernet. The reason we have a CUD is that they understand what they need locally; said it was important that the VCBB doesn't tie the hands of the CUDs.

Paul Fixx: NEK Broadband Chair. Would like to reiterate Christa Shute's comments about the future of our fiber environment. As policy/guidelines are developed, NEK would like them to be flexible to accommodate what future entities may need.

With the close of the Public Comment period, the Chair proposed the formation of a working group and subworking groups with a couple board members, VCBB staff, VCUDA and a couple members from CUDs to review the draft policy. She will provide the list of members during the August 14th meeting.

The Board requested that General Counsel determine whether the statute supports, or does not, the VCBB setting policy based on several comments made regarding the Accountability Policy and that she distributes the Comments Matrix to the public.

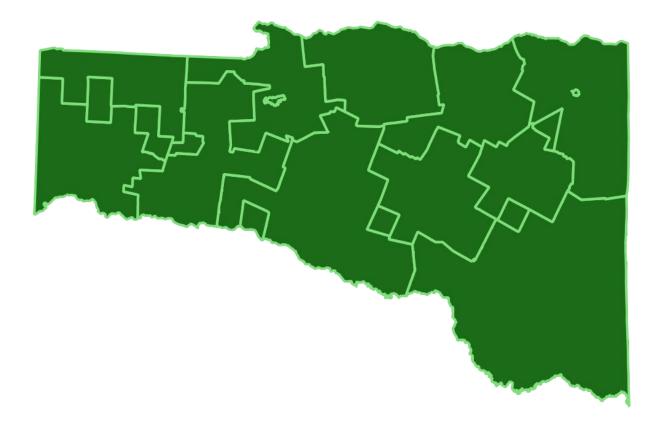

VCUDA Comments on Draft Policy:

- Continued strong support for "accountability" across CUDs
- As municipal governments charged with accountability to Vermonters, CUDs immediate and long term interests are committed to the mission of serving and protecting their community's
- Across CUDs different strong objections and strong support on specific items in the initial draft. (reflected in letters sent to VCBB)
- These comments include substance, structure, process, authority, and enforceability
- Clear that more conversation, listening, and thoughtful analysis will be required to guide implementation of objectives

VCUDA Comments on Process:

- the time to work through complicated items like this together. We are at our best when we bring our best minds together and take
- Lean in to the "community" focus of our broadband effort.
- In this case interested Board, Staff, and CUD representatives
- Would like to see the Board be clear on what outcomes it desires

VCUDA Comments:

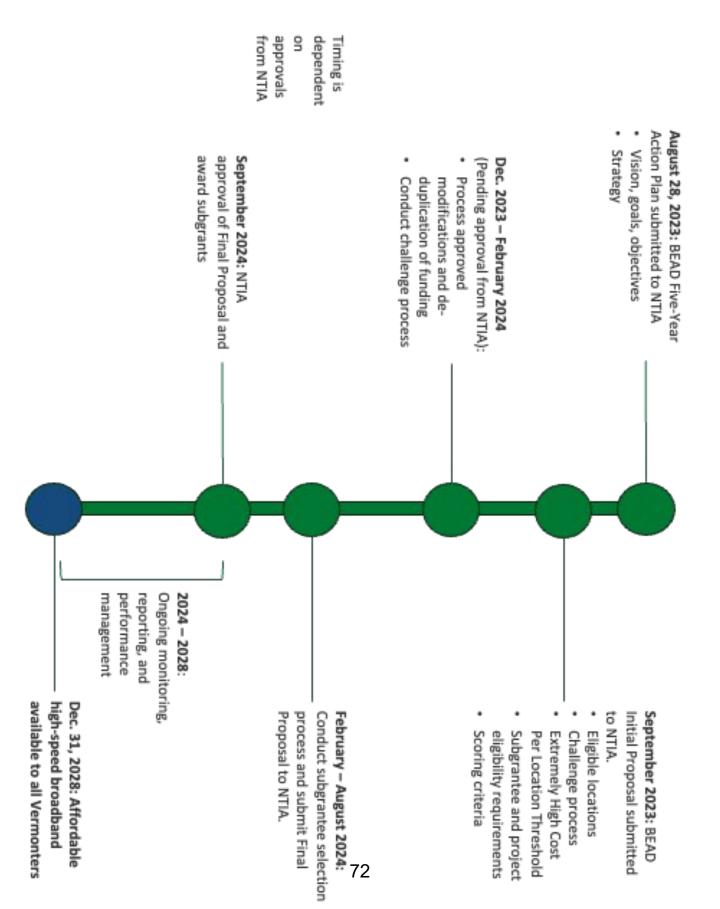

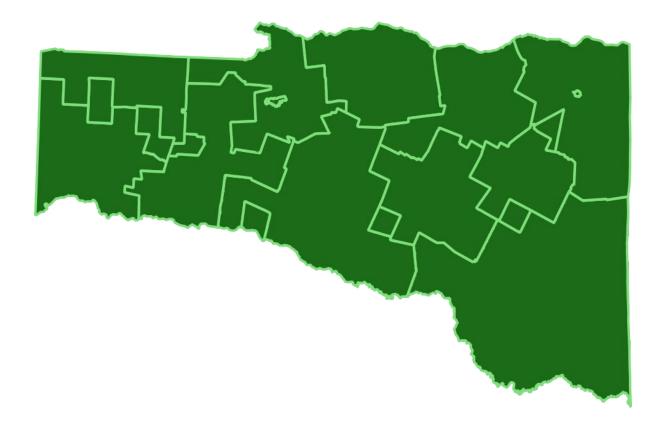

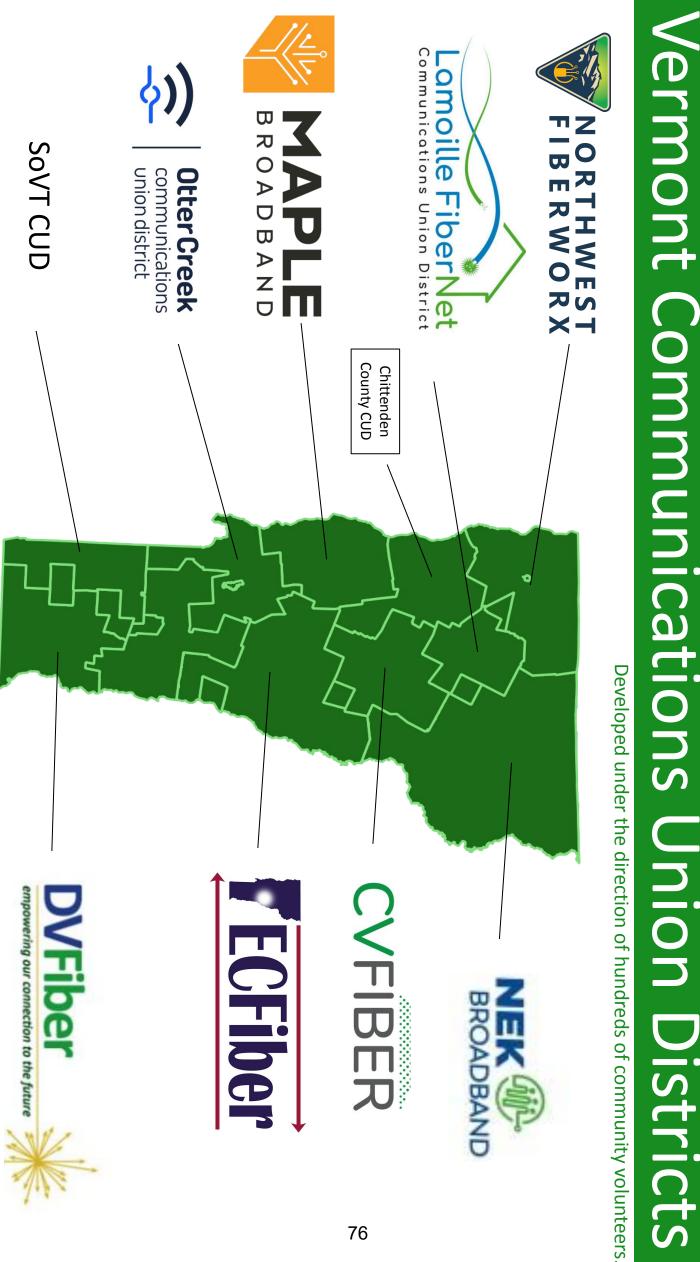

The Secretary of ACCD shall report on the amounts and use of funds distributed by the Business Emergency Gap Assistance Program at the September and November 2023 Joint Fiscal Committee meeting.

Secs. 133(b) and 706(2) to transfer up to \$10 million of the \$35 million that was appropriated in 2022 Acts and Resolves No. 185, Sec. G.600(a)(2), as amended by 2023 Acs and Resolves No. 3, Sec. 67 and 2023 Acts and Resolves No. 78, Sec. C.118, to the Public Service Department to make grants to Efficiency Vermont to fund flood relief measures that are consistent with 30 VSA § 2 (e). The Commissioner of Public Service shall report on the amounts and use of funds distributed for replacement of Vermonters' flood-damaged and destroyed appliances at the September and November 2023 Joint Fiscal Committee meetings."

At the request of the Board, this memo provides a review of the business plan and additional documentation provided by Lamoille FiberNet Communications Union District (LFCUD). Based on our review, LFCUD's construction grant application meets the specifications put forth in the Board's Application Requirements.

LFCUD is proposing a fiber-to-the-premises (FTTP) deployment in two phases consisting of 632 miles of fiber that would connect approximately 9,050 addresses—4,900¹ of which are unserved and underserved—within the 10 member towns.² The total estimated cost for both phases is \$30,731,695. The current grant application focuses on Phase 1, which consists of 549.7 miles of fiber that would connect 7,869 total addresses, including 4,170 eligible addresses. The total cost of Phase 1 is \$25,403,670, or \$6,092 per un/underserved passing.

LFCUD is partnering with Consolidated Communications, Inc. (CCI), which will allow LFCUD to reduce the total cost of the project by approximately 30 percent. CCI has agreed to contribute \$9,814,755 of the total project cost. Seven towns are also contributing local American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds of \$275,800 as a match. The remaining \$15,313,115 is being funded by LFCUD through grant funds, \$1,724,479 of which will come from LFCUD preconstruction grant funds. LFCUD is requesting the remaining balance of \$13,588,636 from VCBB.

Under the partnership, CCI will build, operate, and maintain Phase 1 of the network. LFCUD will own all infrastructure funded by the grant, excluding core infrastructure, while CCI will own all

portions of the network built using CCI's own funding. LFCUD will continue to employ staffing including an executive director and a construction manager in addition to additional organization support such as accountants, legal support, and communications and marketing resources. The responsibilities of LFCUD staff and board include oversight of partnerships including communities and contractors (such as CCI) to ensure all requirements of the contract are being met. Additionally, LFCUD will be engaged in community outreach to promote adoption and digital equity initiatives. The term sheet also outlines performance measures that LFCUD has negotiated with CCI to mitigate risk.

LFCUD plans for construction to begin in early 2024 with completion of Phase 1 by the end of 2025.

LFCUD has not identified a funding source for Phase 2, which consists of 663 eligible addresses. CCI has agreed to build Phase 2 once funding has been secured, potentially including Broadband Equity, Access, & Deployment (BEAD) program funding. Additionally, LFCUD has reserved the right to partner with other providers to complete Phase 2 in the event that another partnership(s) would be more cost effective and reduce overbuild.

On behalf of Lamoille FiberNet Communications Union District ("LFCUD" or "Lamoille FiberNet"), I am pleased to submit this Amendment Application to our current Preconstruction Grant requesting the remaining \$1,369,478 in preconstruction funds. LFCUD also requests a continuation of the current performance period, which is December 2025, to coincide with the completing detailed design and oversight of construction of Phase 1 and preconstruction design and planning activities for Phase 2 of our Universal Service Plan.

This Amendment Application aligns with and is necessary to support our \$13,588,636 Construction Grant Application, also filed today. Leveraging the available preconstruction funds enables LFCUD to maximize available construction funds, thus accelerating broadband deployment to Lamoille County's unserved and underserved addresses.

Supporting Documentation. The following documents are submitted in support of this application: 1) Proposed Timeline and Milestones and 2) Updated Budget Detail showing the Original Grant Budget, actual through May 2023, Forecast through 2023, and Proposed Budget for the Amendment. Proof of insurance and a W-9 are attached separately. Consistent with our current grant, LFCUD will continue to comply with Attachment C (state and federal grant requirements).

Current Grant. LFCUD was awarded Grant 02240-FY22-Act 71 Precon 06 in November 2021 with a performance end date of December 2025, and the expectation that the scope of work would be complete in 18-24 months LFCUD completed feasibility studies, conducted extensive due diligence on eligible addresses and design options, issued competitive bids (RFPs) for construction, network operations and maintenance and provisioning of internet services, all consistent with the Grant's Scope of Work and Act 71. With the support of industry consultants, legal counsel, local partners, LFCUD evaluated various business models, including a dark fiber lease with Google Fiber, standing up a wholly-owned FTTP network supported by subcontracted ISP and network operator and maintenance services, and a public private partnership with Lamoille County's incumbent ILEC, Consolidated Communications. Finally, LFCUD has dedicated substantial effort to building organizational capacity. Its governance, procurement, record retention, and financial control policies, combined with its highly-engaged and experienced Board enable LFCUD to be responsive and resilient.



LFCUD anticipates exhausting its original preconstruction funds (\$1,193,995) prior to December 2023.¹ Two-thirds of the funding (\$816,162) has been spent in support of administrative overhead and professional services (consultants, legal, software and systems, audit, and accounting), the remaining third (\$372,000) is budgeted for detailed design and engineering. LFCUD originally budgeted only for an executive director. In April 2022, LFCUD hired a part-time grant coordinator to support its Executive Director with compliance and grant activities. In September of 2022, LFCUD hired a full-time construction manager to support the development of a detailed design and makeready, and until March 2023 had three employees. Currently, LFCUD has 2 full-time employees (Executive Director and Construction Manager) and a part-time college intern. To support time-sensitive projects such as financial audits, LFCUD has afforded and will continue to budget hourly contractors.

LFCUD 2023 forecast includes funding for our financial audit and our first Single Federal Audit. Legal fees are expected to peak in 2023 due to the number of agreements which need to be drafted and executed, most significantly our partnership agreement with Consolidated Communications.

Proposed Amendment - Planned Spend 2024-2025. The additional funds will be used to support Phase 1 detailed design and engineering and construction oversight (beginning Q3 2023), and the overlapping preconstruction planning for Phase 2 (beginning Q3 2024). The additional funds will also support personnel costs, professional (legal, audit, accounting) services, and other necessary administrative and operating costs. More specifically:

Engineering & Design. Our partner, CCI has budgeted \$1.4 million for detailed engineering and design of Phase 1 of our two-phased Universal Service Plan. LFCUD plans to use its remaining preconstruction funds and a portion of the additional preconstruction funds (capped at \$891,608) to complete detailed engineering and design for Phase 1 of its Universal Service Plan.

Administration, Project Management & Oversight. LFCUD has budgeted \$850,000 to support its operations, compliance and construction oversight during the Phase 1 construction and planning for Phase 2. The proposed 2024 and 2025 operating budget contemplates a 10% reduction in administrative costs. Savings will be realized through cost-sharing partnerships with VCUDA, other CUDs, or Lamoille County partners. LFCUD anticipates continuing to employ an executive director and project manager, at either reduced time or through shared services arrangements. LFCUD budgeted reduced legal fees for Phase 1 (2024 and 2025) of \$55,000, compared to \$88,000 for the past two years. Insurance, utilities, memberships, subscriptions, and marketing are budgeted with slight adjustments for inflation.

¹ LFCUD has also been supported by a \$25,000 USDA grant in partnership with Lamoille County Planning Commission, \$35,000 Vermont Community Foundation grant, and a \$120,000 CARES grant. Some of these funds supported a feasibility study, pole study and a county needs assessment survey.



Preconstruction Budget - Two Items of note:

- In-house Construction Manager. Our in-house construction manager has dedicated considerable effort to riding out our communities to document the availability of broadband, assessing pole conditions and routes, working with pole owners and other CUDs, all of which contributed to the network design and construction readiness. Based on our accountant's advice, these preconstruction activities which could have been allocated to design or makeready, were assigned to personnel, until a construction start date was certain. Once construction begins, our manager will be active in the field, monitoring CCI's progress and compliance. For consistency and simplicity, these internal costs will continue to be in LFCUD's Administrative Budget.
- 2. Need to Repurpose Pre-purchased Fiber. As contemplated by the Precon 06 Grant, LFCUD began the process of procuring key construction materials in late 2021. Through VCUDA, LFCUD pre-purchased roughly 131 miles of 48- and 144-count fiber valued at \$428,000. LFCUD # 02240-FY22-Act 71 Precon 06 Preconstruction was amended to include \$281,652 from the materials pre-purchase program, and a \$146,521 advance from its construction allocation. See #02240-FY22-Act 71 Precon 06 Amendments 2,3, and 4. The attached Preconstruction Budget reflects the pre-purchase of materials and construction advance as is.

Our partner, CCI, cannot use this fiber. To ensure compliance with state and federal grant requirements, Guidehouse and VCBB staff advised LFCUD to repurpose the fiber by donating it to another CUD. LFCUD expects to repurpose the fiber to Northwest CUD ("NWCUD"). LFCUD anticipates submitting a fully-executed Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") with NWCUD prior to the August 14, 2023 VCBB meeting.² In reliance on the MOU, LFCUD's Construction Grant application will request a true-up of LFCUD construction allocation by crediting the LFCUD's \$146,521 advance. LFCUD will defer to VCBB regarding how to reconcile and document adjustments in LFCUD and NWCUD's preconstruction and construction grants.

² NWCUD has a need for this fiber and has reviewed LFCUD's invoices and draft Memorandum of Understanding. The MOU contemplates that LFCUD will donate the fiber to NWCUD contingent on approval of LFCUD's construction grant application. NWCUD has provided provisional approval of the MOU and is awaiting legal review and Executive committee endorsement.

At the request of the Board, this memo provides a review of the business plan and additional documentation provided by Otter Creek Communications Union District (OCCUD). Based on our review, OCCUD's construction grant application meets the specifications put forth in the Board's Application Requirements.

OCCUD has proposed a fiber-to-the-premises (FTTP) deployment in four phases to reach its 2,920¹ eligible addresses within the 18 member towns.² Phase 1, including 38 unserved locations, was completed and fully financed by Consolidated Communications, Inc (CCI). The remaining 2,882 addresses are separated into three additional phases. OCCUD estimates the costs for Phases 2 and 3 to total \$19,400,131, consisting of 474 miles of fiber to serve 2,715 eligible locations. OCCUD has not yet estimated the cost for Phase 4. The current grant application focuses on Phase 2, which consists of 356 miles of fiber that would connect 4,135 total addresses, including 2,316 eligible addresses. The total cost of Phase 2 is \$14,655,482, or \$6,328 per un/underserved passing.

OCCUD is partnering with CCI, and CCI has agreed to contribute \$4,343,210 of the total project cost for Phase 2. OCCUD noted that it will also utilize Act 71 (H.360) pre-construction grant funds of \$360,000 to support the project through the construction period. OCCUD is requesting the remaining balance of \$9,952,272 for Phase 2 from VCBB.

¹ The total eligible addresses increased by 170 that were not included in VCBB's eligible address list, consisting of 39 addresses that OCCUD believes are unserved and 131 that it confirms were receiving service below 25/3 Mbps. ² Member towns are Benson, Brandon, Castleton, Chittenden, Fair Haven, Goshen, Hubbardton, Mendon, Pawlet, Pittsford, Poultney, Rutland City, Rutland Town, Shrewsbury, Sudbury, Wells, West Haven, and West Rutland.

Under the partnership, CCI will build, operate, and maintain Phase 2 and 3 of the network. OCCUD will own all infrastructure funded by the grant, excluding core infrastructure, while CCI will own all portions of the network built using CCI's own funding. As part of OCCUD's pre-construction grant request, OCCUD will be funding contractors and staff in support of its efforts over an eighteen-month period. Among their various responsibilities, the contractors and staff will have direct oversight and the ability to monitor the construction of CCI. OCCUD will also be engaged in community outreach to promote adoption. The term sheet also outlines performance measures that OCCUD has negotiated with CCI to mitigate risk.

OCCUD plans for construction to begin in early 2024 with completion of Phase 2 by the end of 2025.

OCCUD has not identified a funding source for Phase 3 or 4, which consists of 400 eligible addresses. CCI has agreed to build Phase 3 once funding has been secured, potentially including Broadband Equity, Access, & Deployment (BEAD) program funding. Additionally, OCCUD has reserved the right to partner with other providers to complete Phase 3 and 4 in the event that another partnership(s) would be more cost effective.

On behalf of the Otter Creek Communications Union District (OCCUD), I am writing to propose an amendment to the previously awarded Broadband Preconstruction Grant. As the OCCUD reviews our initial request from June 2022, the need for support for our preconstruction activities and the provision of funding for additional needs have been identified. The team has made substantial progress over the past year, and we intend to submit an application for the Act 71 Broadband Construction Grant for the VCBB August 2023 meeting, with construction scheduled to begin in 2024. In the past few months of 2023, we determined that we need professional leadership for the organization going forward. Thus, we are including costs for a part-time executive director in our budget. We also recognize a need for construction services during the construction season in 2024. Thus, the proposed additions and changes are aimed at fulfilling these needs of the H360 Preconstruction Grant (Sept 2023 through Dec 2025). Otter Creek CUD anticipates seeking an additional amendment at the end of 2025 to fund the CUD during the construction year 2026, or possibly sooner if construction funding is made available and our partner-provider is able to accelerate construction to occur in 2025.

The OCCUD intends to hire an executive director either on a part-time basis or possibly a shared salary with Lamoille CUD.

- Vantage Point Solutions provides Project Management services.

Section 3: Strategy and Proposed Activities

<u>b.</u> <u>Anticipated Need</u>s

To support the OCCUD with its goals and strategy over the next 18 months, it has and will need to retain the expertise and services such as:

- a full time project manager
 - OCCUD anticipates needing a full-time project manager as construction ramps up. It currently is contracted with a project manager for part time services. Having gone through an RFP process to identify a contractor for these services, OCCUD found that contractors providing project manager services have a potential fee range of \$120 to \$200 per hour. Estimating at the rate of \$120 per hour for full time work over 18 months results in a potential cost of \$318,240. A project manager ensures that the CUD pushes forward towards its goal of universal high speed internet access for member towns by applying for funding, managing grants, overseeing reporting, coordinating meetings, updating website content, document management, town and partnership management, and pulling together any resources or parties necessary to drive work towards completion.

Amend – to 28 months but part-time services

- legal services
 - Throughout all of this process, concerted need for legal presence will be in demand. This involves a substantial investment. The investment in legal services is undoubtedly absolutely necessary and having the funds available to pay for it if necessary as well. An estimated cost of \$11,000 was provided by Primmer Piper Eggleston & Cramer in 2021 for needs such as this, which was anticipated to last for 6 months. Taking this historical estimate combined with the recent expense the CUD incurred to have two RFPs given a legal review as a means to gauge current costs and applying it to an 18 month timeframe, OCCUD estimates a potential need for \$50,000 in possible legal expenses.

Amend – to 28 months. Reduced services needs as contract negotiations with partner-provider are completed.

- an accountant
 - OCCUD currently has an accountant contracted for a monthly fee of \$695. These services are a critical support for fiscal oversight and management. Should the same business and rate be retained for 18 months, this cost would be \$12,510.
 Amend to 28 months of services.
- technical support for its website
 - Technical support and hosting fees for OCCUD's website are \$1,200 a year. As such there would be a \$2,400 expense over the next 18 months.
 Amend website services include in Operational expenses.



strategic support for its partnership development

 When negotiations and discussions of potential contracts such as a likely PPP begin, the OCCUD must also have experts in the field alongside them. Bringing on a consultant that has that expertise and experience to shepherd the organizational formation and contract development is critical as that expertise does not currently exist in the volunteer board base that is working to get the CUD up and running. To this end, the OCCUD received a proposal of services from

CTC Consulting – a consultant who has experience and expertise working not only in this field but also in Vermont. This proposal and cost estimate was received in 2021 as part of OCCUD's H315 grant application.. CTC would be providing support to include:

- Evaluation of public private partnership proposals and business terms (technical and business parameters).
- Negotiation of one or more definitive public private partnership agreements
- Additional business planning or financial modeling as needed.
- CTC's experience in Vermont both with the State as well as with individual CUD's would greatly supported a business outcome that is informed by and connected to state level work and that of other CUD's. They provided a proposal with a blended rate of \$180/hr. The OCCUD estimates a potential need of 200 hours of support, resulting in the estimated cost of \$36,000.

Amendment: OCCUD did not seek or enter into a contract with CTC Consulting. However, we have recognized that we should have professional guidance, most likely in the form of an executive director. Therefore, the salary for a part-time executive director is now added to our budget.

The OCCUD also has determined that an independent third-party construction engineer should be hired by the OCCUD to oversee and report on the construction progress of our partner. Therefore, the cost of a full-time construction engineer for construction inspection, field verification, and reporting is now added to our budget.



Funding will additionally be needed expenses such as Google voice, Zoom, Front Porch Forum, cost of insurance, banking fees, and estimated annual VCUDA fees. These fees can be broken down as depicted in the table below:

These fees allow for communication services from email, to phone, to virtual meetings as well as document management. Additionally, there is the expense of **VCUDA annual fees at an annual cost of \$10,597.**

Amendment: VCUDA fees have increased.

Based on the current guidance of OCCUD's business plan, should OCCUD partner with an Incumbent Local Exchange Carrier additional preconstruction expenses such as make-ready and detailed engineering will be avoided. As such, of the \$1,705,133 that has been allocated to possible preconstruction costs for an OCCUD buildout and with the information OCCUD currently has available, \$421,936 is the total anticipated preconstruction cost anticipated over the next 18 months.

Amendment: OCCUD has partnered with an ILEC of only part of the CUD territory. A large portion of the CUD's territory is however outside of the partner's LEC territory, making costs for make-ready and pole licensing more costly and thus increasing the project's pre-construction expenses.

As well, we now understand that the costs of pre-construction, which we were previously budgeting into our construction grant application, may be paid for in the pre-construction fund. Thus, we have re-allocated some of the engineering design costs and other make-ready costs to this pre-construction budget.

At the request of the Board, CTC has provided a review of the business plan and additional documentation provided by East Central Vermont Telecommunications District (ECFiber). Based on our review, ECFiber's construction grant application meets the specifications put forth in the Board's Application Requirements.

ECFiber currently provides services to 23 of its original member towns¹. ECFiber is proposing to extend its fiber-to-the-premises deployment to its eight new member towns² as well as associated border areas. ECFiber's extension will consist of 543 miles of fiber that would connect approximately 8,156 addresses—3,457 of which are unserved and underserved—over nine stages. ECFiber anticipates completing stages one through eight by the end of 2024. Stage nine, consisting of only 3 eligible locations, would be complete by the end of 2025. The total costs for the nine stages are \$30,422,376, or \$8,800 per un/underserved passing.

ECFiber has an existing partnership with GWI Vermont, LLC (GWI) for design, build, and operations of the ECFiber network. The partnership with GWI will expand to include the newly added nine stages of the ECFiber network extension. ECFiber has been cash flow positive for more than five years, funding operations and bond payments solely through revenue. With the

projections including the new member towns, ECFiber remains cash flow positive covering both operations and increased bond payments.

ECFiber's grant application is for \$30,422,376 with a match from ECFiber of \$17,194,719 million, consisting of \$2,194,719 million from its operations surplus and \$15 million from additional bonds. ECFiber is requesting the remaining \$13,227,657 from VCBB, or \$3,826 per un/underserved passings. ECFiber commits to providing universal service to all stages in the application by the end of 2025.

CTC submitted several questions and conducted additional discussions with ECFiber to further clarify portions of the application specifically focused on outside plant (OSP) design standards and redundancy. ECFiber provided all necessary details and all requirements were met. Attached is the checklist used to evaluate the application, business plan, and network design.
