

Progress toward meeting Vermont's goal of 100/100 mbps broadband service at every E-911 location:

- 10 Districts
- 216 Member Towns
- 428 Volunteer Board Representatives
 & Alternates
- More than 76% the state's population
- 93% of premises statewide without access to 25/3
- 76% of all serviceable addresses

About the Communications Union Districts

- Each CUD organized as a result of Town Meeting vote to join a CUD.
- Each *town* appoints *representatives* to *participate directly in the CUD governance* and transparent administration.
- A CUD is a multi-town municipality. (with revenue bond authority, but not taxing authority)
- Committed to universal service will reach to every on-grid address starting with the currently unserved and underserved.
- Accountable and Transparent Town representation in governance assures grassroots involvement, transparency, and accountability.
- Public Ownership All assets funded by the CUD are owned by the CUD municipality.
- *Private Partnership* CUDs typically use a traditional RFP to select a commercial partner to operate the CUD infrastructure.


